Be a rubbish revolutionary...

Are you worried about the environment? Think we should be doing more... but one person can't make a difference, right? WRONG!

If you want to do more to help your local environment then the Cambs. County Council's Master Recycler scheme could be just the thing for you. We are looking for 150 volunteers from around Cambridgeshire to sign up to the new Master Recycler scheme. Training to be come a Master Recycler takes just one day; a morning learning about the benefits of recycling and how your kerbside collection works followed by an afternoon visit to a Materials Recycling Facility so you can see what happens to your rubbish. Lunch will be provided.

Once trained as a Master Recycler your role will be to make sure you know what your kerbside scheme takes and that your box is put out of the correct day — it's that simple. Your District Council will keep you informed of any changes to your scheme and you can then let people know about the change in whatever way you choose. Additional activities such as survey work are welcomed but not compulsory.

Needles and Syringes What if you find them?

East Cambridgeshire does not have a large drug problem. However, a small amount of drug users sometimes discard needles and syringes thoughtlessly. It is possible that at some time you or someone you know may find a needle or syringe in a public area. If this happens, you need to know how to arrange for this to be disposed of quickly and safely, so that we can safeguard our community from any potential risk. If you do find a needle or syringe:

Do **not** touch it Do **not** hide it

Do not kick it down a drain or out of sight

Do not put it in a dustbin, litter bin or down a toilet

Do telephone the District Council or the Police on the numbers below to arrange for it to be removed. The needle will be collected as soon as possible, but it may not be collected immediately. If you want to do something yourself to protect others, cover it with a strong box or tin until someone can collect it.

WARNING: Do not remove a needle yourself - safe disposal is essential and there is a risk of injury.

The East Cambridgeshire Community Safety Partnership has produced a three-year strategy for how crime and disorder in the district will be tacked. The main priorities included in the Strategy are:

- · Anti-social Behaviour
- Substance Misuse
- · Property Crime vehicle crime and burglary
- · Violent Crime
- Protecting vulnerable groups (such older people and ethnic minorities)
- · Reducing the fear of crime
- · Increasing levels of reporting
- Developing data sources for future research and to inform project work
- Adopting a problem solving approach to reducing crime and disorder in Ely, Soham, Littleport and Burwell
- · Reducing the Risk Factors of crime

Some funding is available to community groups who are experiencing any of the problems listed above and can provide details of how their project would reduce crime and disorder.

Energy Efficiency

"The scientific evidence is growing that man-made greenhouse gas emissions are having a noticeable effect on the earth's climate. Globally, 7 of the 10 warmest years on record were in the 1990's. In the future, the Earth's climate could warm by as much as 3°C over the next 100 years. The social, environmental and economic costs associated with this could be huge." (Source: Dept for environment, food and rural affairs. Climate Change).

Scary stuff made all the more real by the recent floods at home and in Europe.

You may ask yourself what we can do on a local level to alleviate this very real problem.

One area where we can all make a difference is by reducing the amount of energy we use to heat and power our own homes. Did you know that domestic dwellings produce approximately 25% of UK CO2 emissions and that the average home produces more CO2 per year than the average car? That's enough to fill 6 hot air balloons 10 metres in diameter! It has also been calculated that we waste around £200 per household per year by heating and powering hour homes inefficiently and that a regular house loses over 40% of it's heat through loft spaces and walls!

"Is your home behaving badly?" is a magazine produced by EST, copies of which can be obtained by telephoning the Energy Advice Centre on 0800 512012. It details that the energy efficiency grants that are currently available and also contains some handy tips on how we can all save energy, money and protect our environment.

In the Garden

We are looking for a knowledgeable gardener to provide us will a regular column on what we should all be doing throughout the year. For this issue we have the following contribution from someone who wants to go under the name of I. Diggam!

Not Too Late!

Most people go too much by the book and don't seem to realise that most crops can be grown much later than would normally be expected. By the time you read this summer will be here and that is normally a time for tending and looking after what has already been planted. However, there are a lot of things that can still be propagated or bought and planted out.

Runner beans are still available and it is now time to plant them out. If you can't find any, plant some seed because you will still get a good crop even if it is a little late. The same applies to French beans, tomatoes and cucumbers but, if planting seed, bring them on in a pot in a warm, sunny place with a clear plastic bag over it. The bag will retain the heat and keep the atmosphere moist — just the right conditions for hurrying them up but give them fresh air regularly!

Don't forget to take out the side shoots from tomatoes unless you want a bush of small tomatoes.

Keep sowing radish but not too many unless you live on them. They grow fast and can be planted at least until August. It is not too late to sow the main root crops like beetroot, turnip and carrots for a late harvest.

Sow spring and Chinese cabbage and plant any fastgrowing varieties. It's not even too late for Brussels sprouts! Marrow plants are still available and should be planted out in rich soil.

Don't forget to protect strawberries and raspberries from birds and don't let rhubarb go to seed.

Lettuce can be sown for the next month or so but always choose a variety with taste. You can sow lettuce very thickly in a bed. They will support one another and you simply cut the leaves off as and when required. New ones will grow and it is a virtually perpetual supply for salads until late in the year.

Many early crops are now ready for harvesting. Don't leave them longer than necessary. If onions and shallots have been planted early make sure they don't go to seed.

In the flower garden it is time to stake gladioli and large chrysanthemums. Also, take cuttings from carnations and pinks. Use rooting compound to speed up rooting. It is also time to feed hanging baskets to keep the blooms going and don't forget to dead-head them. Do the same to roses as this will extend their flowering season.

Make sure that hops and other climbers are tied in place. They grow very fast, particularly following rain, and you need to keep your eye on them.

Above all, gardening should not be a chore. Do the minimum to keep it in good order so that you can enjoy it!

News

St Andrew's Parish Church Appeal

For those of you that have not heard the story, 141 years ago (back in 1862) the church tower collapsed. We are informed that it was probably shoddy workmanship and not the quality of the Isleham clunch that was used as the foundation to support that massive weight!

The tower was rebuilt and is fine but our Parish Church is in a sad state of repair and buckets are used to collect rain that comes through the roof. The plaster is coming off the walls and there is no heating. It is in desperate need of repair. Therefore, whatever your religion or even non-religion, your help is required if this wonderful old building is to be saved and preserved.

Christopher Goodwins, our parish vicar, has sent us the following information about the appeal.

You will know by now that an appeal has been launched to restore the parish church. English Heritage generously awarded a grant of £70,000, followed by ECDC's £10,000. With the £15,000 we have raised ourselves, this makes £95,000 towards the £150,000 needed. We aim to repair the roof, install heating, rewire the building electrically, restore the plasterwork, cater for the hard of hearing and improve access for disabled people. The result of all this will be to leave the building in good repair for future generations to enjoy. The difference about the parish church is that it "belongs" to every resident of Isleham, of whatever denomination of faith or none, whether they worship here or not. Our parish church is as much a symbol of faith as a mosque is to Moslems, a synagogue to Jews, or a temple to Buddhists. On behalf of all of us at St. Andrew's, I would therefore like to thank the community for their generous support, and tireless encouragement.
