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Community Centre Update

onsiderable progress has been made since my last report, three months ago. Of massive positive impact has been the foresight shown by the Parish Council in the proposed sale of land adjoining the cemetery (as announced in the last Informer) and allocation of some of the proceeds to the Community Centre. This great news, together with an encouraging verbal response from a representative of one major grant source, has given us sufficient confidence to instruct our architects to start drawing up plans for an impressive multi-purpose complex that we truly believe would prove to be an enormous asset to the village. I must stress the word 'would' – we still face obstacles.

To whet your appetite... the centre being planned is about 1100 square metres, and would hopefully provide at least the following:

- Superb changing facilities to accommodate the ever-increasing sporting activities in the village
- A large, impressive, sub-dividable function hall for wedding receptions, drama productions etc., with a stage, lighting, and access to a well-equipped kitchen and to a bar
- Multi-purpose meeting/conference rooms
- A bar/coffee lounge with access to indoor and outdoor children's play-areas
- Two offices (one for the Parish Clerk)
- Toilets and cloakrooms
- Internal and external storage
- Patio areas, landscaping, car parking, lighting, security systems etc.

The centre will cater for the disabled and address environmental issues.

It is hoped that initial drawings will be available by Gala Day. As far as siting, design etc. of the Centre is concerned, we await suggestions from the architects.

Now I must refer to some of the more major remaining challenges. In addition to likely sources of income referred to above, we need at least one more 'substantial' grant to more or less guarantee our



ultimate Centre. Over the coming weeks and months we will be making many applications, but arguably the Big Lottery is our best chance for a substantial grant. Unfortunately, because of the 2012 Olympic Games, grants from this source are stopping in the near future. To even stand a chance with the Big Lottery in the next two years we had to make an application by the end of April. Ian Thorburn in particular 'burned the midnight oil' to achieve this deadline – the amount and diversity of supportive information required is beyond belief!

I have named Ian, but thanks are also due to the many others have also stepped forward to offer their help, and the individuals and organisations who supplied some of the supportive information.

Incidently, this also includes a Business Plan that covers many areas, including how the Centre would be run and how it would be financed post construction. Our calculations are that it would, at least, break even financially from Year 1 onwards. We also have a vision as to how it would be managed, but need to discuss these ideas with the Parish Council before giving further details.

Time is on our side, as we have now to wait patiently for a decision from the Big Lottery. In fact, it will be well over a year, even if our Stage 1 application is successful, before we learn whether or not we are to be granted money.

Another major challenge is to be placed on you, me and all other residents of Isleham. All major grant providers, before giving us money, require evidence of what they describe as matched funding. Basically this means that we have to show them that we have committed some of our monies to the project before they will commit theirs. Back in 1952, when the Village Hall was built, the residents had to contribute 50% of the cost – and they did. Thanks mainly to the proposed monies from the Parish Council, the contribution required from us is only about 5% – but this still equates to many thousands of pounds. We will be seeking corporate and other business sponsorship as well as organising various fund-raising events, but, when called upon we will need a generous response from you also. In the meantime if you would like to organise a fundraising event then please contact Diane Bayliss (01638 781687): we can help publicise it.

We are in the process of establishing a charitable trust, to be known as the Isleham Community Association. When this, with its own bank account, is in place we will be requesting donations by cheque, standing orders etc. As I stated in the last edition of the Informer, the time is coming for us to stand up and be counted. Residents did this in 1952 – are we prepared to make similar sacrifices? With your help, and one more substantial grant, Isleham should have its multi-purpose Community Centre which we, and the vast majority of the respondents to our questionaire, believe will be of immeasurable benefit to the village.

Sift together the dry ingredients then rub in the margarine. Next, stir in the liquid ingredients and beat well. Pour into two 8" cake tins – this mixture is quite runny. Cook at 180°C, 325/350°F or gas mark 3 or 4. When cool, sandwich together with chocolate butter icing.

POLICE MATTERS Police Report

• PCSO Gaynor Foster now only working three days per week, is Kieran covering for her? Can we have a phone number for him? Can the council write to the police saying that we are getting very little contact or information?

Neighbourhood Panel

- Unfortunately no one from Isleham attended the meeting, as people don't seem to know it is on. This is an opportunity for members of the public to express their views about the Police, District Council and County Council.
- After the November meeting police were asked to take action at Thirwall Drive in Fordham there has been a bigger police presence, Hereward Housing are also taking action. Speeding has been and continues to be addressed in all villages.
- The next meeting will be held on 21st March at Soham Pavilion. This will be attended by representatives from District Council and Environmental Services to discuss the refuse collection trials.

Antisocial Behaviour

• District Council have set aside money to deal with antisocial behaviour problems.

VILLAGE HALL MATTERS Report from Village Hall Committee

- Conditions of hire almost ready to be sent out.
- New strip light diffusers put on.
- Need to keep standards up at the village hall until the new community centre is built.

RECREATION GROUND MATTERS Report from Recreation Ground Committee

- Blec have finished works to New Recreation Ground extra area has all been seeded.
- Football Foundation must have signage erecting three signs centre of each side. Will there be signs for ECDC as they contributed as well?
- Next payment date from Football Foundation 14th February.
- New Recreation Ground needs rolling.
- The Council need to be looking for a tractor with turf tyres before the grass cutting season.
- To appoint architect for New Community Centre. Several practices interviewed. Johns Practice selected from these. It was agreed that they be appointed subject to contract.
- Resurfacing Play Area: It was agreed that the chairman and Mrs Malkin make the decision about the resurfacing of the Play Area.
- Mr Cox and Mrs Malkin have tried to pressure wash the play area but with no success, Chris Harvey is willing to pressure wash the algae off the rubber surfacing at a charge £250 per day however there will be no charge if it does not work. It was agreed that the chairman and Mrs Malkin make a decision regarding this problem.

HIGHWAYS/FOOTPATH MATTERS

• CCC RE: East Fen Drove - It is not possible to widen this road at present. However, the council would like to write to the County Council and County Councillor Powley about the roundabout that is overdue on the Soham By-pass.






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Three Rívers Group Church News



From the Rev'd Mike Banyard, Rector Designate, Three Rivers Group (Chippenham, Fordham, Isleham, Kennett & Snailwell)

n 17th June, a new priest, the Rev'd Kate Peacock, will be joining the ministry team in these five villages. I am delighted that she

is joining us and will start her ministry here. Kate has been Curate in one of the largest parishes in Cambridge for the past four years, and has now felt duly called to minister here. Kate and her family will live in the Vicarage in Fordham, though she will be fully involved in all five churches and in the three schools, here in Isleham, at Fordham and Kennett too. I'm going to let her tell her own story!

Kate writes:

"I must begin by saying how delighted I am that I am coming to Isleham to be the Associate Priest in the Three Rivers Group, and how much I am looking forward to working with you all. For me and my family there seems to be a real sense of 'rightness' about this move and real sense of God's calling to me to minister alongside you. But first a little about myself!

I have felt a call to be a priest since I was about 14 years old, and I can honestly and thankfully say that this



initial sense of call has not diminished over the years, but only strengthened. I can remember the moment well, I was with my Grandparents and they were asking me what it was I wanted to do when I grew up (as they do!) I, never having entertained this thought in my life before, replied that I wished to be a vicar. Well, you can perhaps imagine the stunned silence in the room, and I was more stunned than anyone. This was a new thought entirely, but deep down and in my heart I knew that this was what I was going to do – a real sense of call and joy filled me – and I haven't looked back!

From then followed confirmation (I did do all this in the wrong order!), being a server in church, continuing my education and finally the selection process. Thankfully I was selected by the Church and I went on after my undergraduate degree in Durham to Westcott House in 2001 to begin training for Ordination. And somewhere along the way Daniel and I were married! It was a busy few years! Daniel was also training while I was, but in the very different field of accountancy (an absolute blessing when it is tax return time!) He is currently the Financial Controller for a technology company on the Science Park in Cambridge.

It was at Westcott House, one of the theological colleges in Cambridge, that I met Mike and we trained and were Ordained together in Ely Cathedral. Since then I have been the Assistant Curate at the Parish of the Ascension in Cambridge, and during this four years I have had our two children, Emma (two and a half) and Alice (nearly one). This is a very busy parish of about 20,000 people with schools, colleges, businesses and residential homes – as well as the three churches. I have loved being there and it will be sad leaving, having enjoyed the privilege of getting to know people and ministering with them.

But, leave I must and I am filled with excitement and enthusiasm for my next post and I very much look forward to getting to know you all in the coming months."

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


