The village of Isleham has a number of Allotments available. Many Isleham Residents keep plots, but we are hoping enthusiasts from surrounding villages will be keen to take up the opportunity of having one of their own.

In many parishes, allotments are in short supply and you would need to put your name on a waiting list. Isleham is very fortunate to have large areas of land, and plots of 10 rods or more are available to rent at a very reasonable rate.

This year there are a number of improvements planned for our Dunstall Allotments along Station Road. The roadway through the land is to be improved and water will be put on. We are also looking into putting some of the land into a Community Orchard.

In 2010 a group of local people started the 'Isleham Gardeners'. As members of the National Society of Allotment & Leisure Gardeners, Isleham Gardeners are able to purchase quality seeds more cheaply. They hold monthly talks on gardening topics given by professionals in their field, and a variety of other social occasions provide a pleasant opportunity to meet with like-minded people.

estimate that Cambridgeshire has lost 80% of its orchards in the last fifty years.

In order to reverse this trend "Common Ground", a national charity, has pioneered the Community Orchard Scheme. As the name suggests, community orchards are planted and maintained by volunteers from within the community. Such orchards offer a way of saving vulnerable old fruit trees and provide opportunity to plant new ones.

The benefits of these orchards are many. In addition to the production of local varieties of apples, they can provide educational opportunities for children, a rich habitat for wildlife and a place to walk or have picnics. Community orchards are

therefore open and accessible to the public at all times.

Isleham has many vacant allotments. Creating a community orchard would be a sensible way of keeping some of them cultivated and productive. Isleham Parish Council has agreed that an area of unused land on the Dunstall Allotments site, Station Road, could be set apart for this purpose.

The project would be run by a volunteer management group. The East of England Apple and Orchard Project provide appropriate training courses and workshops. Grants are available for the purchasing of equipment and trees.

The success of a community orchard lies in the strength of the local commitment to it.

If there are enough enthusiastic volunteers, we could plan and prepare to plant an orchard this winter.

Disabled Children's Access to Childcare (DCATCH)

<u>D</u>isabled <u>C</u>hildren's <u>A</u>ccess <u>I</u>o <u>C</u>Hildcare



he Cambridgeshire County Council Disabled Children's Access to Childcare (DCATCH) project is aimed at supporting parents/carers of disabled children in accessing suitable childcare; enabling them the chance of returning to employment and/or training. It is part of the Cambridgeshire Childcare Information Service (CIS).

The aim of DCATCH is to highlight that "a child with a disability and his/her family should have access to the full range of childcare options that are open to other families" Sure Start, 2005.

"A lack of information about the childcare services that are available, and confusion about the quality and potential benefits of using childcare, continue to create barriers for some parents". Department for children, schools and families, December 2009.

The aim of the project is to work closely with parents, childcare providers and professionals, embedding the principles of DCATCH; ensuring inclusion into early years and childcare settings for

all. A referral service for parents shows where to go for support and guidance with their childcare options via the Childcare Brokerage Service.

Once a family is identified we can then, through the CIS Childcare Brokerage Service, enquire about suitable childcare. This will include information on provision of childcare from providers, funding options, costs, specialist care and specialist facilities, if required by the provider.

The DCATCH project provides a service to families, which is free of charge and completely impartial.

COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

The possibility of a new school for Isleham is now on the list of schools to be considered for the District.

It was agreed that a sum of £130 be made to Isleham Citizens Advice Bureau.

COMMUNITY CENTRE

Discussion took place about whether the PC should keep direct control of the Centre. This has yet to be decided. It was proposed by the Chairman that the Council take out a loan of £500,000 for a period of 25 years. Concerns were expressed about the length of the loan, also whether it can be paid back at an earlier date, if appropriate. A paper vote was then taken, the result being six votes in favour and three against. The motion was therefore carried. A copy of the contract will be given to each Councillor, and one kept with the minutes.

HIGHWAYS/FOOTPATHS

It is likely that money to pay for work to be carried out on Parish paths will no longer be available from CCC, so PC will have to look to work parties of councillors and parishioners to do this.

CCC has stated that salt supplies are very low and they are looking for alternative materials to fill the grit bins.

OPEN FORUM FOR PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Mrs Clarke addressed the Council with a number of questions related to the Community Centre project, which the Chairman agreed to have minuted:

- 1. Is the PC now in a position to confirm the total proceeds from the sale of the cemetery land? This matter will be addressed later in the meeting.
- 2. There are concerns regarding the business plan and the uncertainty shown over some areas. Could we have assurances that the business plan: a) is in two parts covering the capital project and the ongoing revenue items? b) independently audited and found to be fit for purpose, and therefore did the Parish

Councillors get full (independent) assurance that the plan worked? The business plan seemed to be based on the successful Over model. However, Over is located on the outskirts of Cambridge, whereas Isleham is a small fenland village – how was this factored into the calculations?

What margin is there in the plan for over-estimates of revenue income and under-estimates of running costs? What assurances can the PC give us that further funds will not be asked from us if (a) the initial building project over-runs on budget? And (b) the estimated running costs and income generation are wrong?

These points will need to be replied to at another time as the PC has not had any direct input into the business plan.

3. Will all grants and funding be in place before the project starts?

Obviously £1m will be in place and most of the other grants should be as they usually have to be applied for before the project commences.

4. Vote: the village vote was compromised – at the meeting one lady (who was speaking against the project) said that she did not get a voting paper, but managed to "pick one up at the Co-op". How did that happen and what assurances do we have that non-council tax payers did not get one - or that multiple votes were cast?

Cllr Wilkes addressed this matter as she works at the Co-op and personally gave a form to the lady in question. All photocopied forms were disregarded in the count either for or against the project.

5. We would like a village referendum on such an important issue as this.

The Parish Council are under no obligation legally to carry out a referendum on this matter.

VILLAGE HALL MATTERS

The budget has overrun this year, so any expenditure must be kept to essentials. New smoke alarms and a mop will be purchased. A new PPL licence called is now required and will affect all groups who play music.

RECREATION GROUND

The PC congratulated Mr Ray Sheldrick who has been given a Groundsman of the Year award. It was agreed letters be sent to the churches and local interest groups if they are interested in holding an event for Poppy Weekend in June.

OTHER BUSINESS

It was reported that the final sum received for the Cemetery land was £764,929, including £36k, which is to be reclaimed from ECDC.

It was agreed that £400 be paid to the Staploe Transport Association.

The Parish Council election is to be held on 5th May.

PARISH PLAN

CCC will arrange for the installation of bollards on Malting Lane.

More dog bins are to be installed.

Footpaths will be checked in March, and remedial work carried out.

Leaves of footpaths will hopefully be cleared next winter by the village maintenance person in between visits from Veolia.

ALLOTMENT MATTERS

The possibility of setting up a Community Orchard is being looked in to.

Work has begun on the borehole.

PLANNING MATTERS

Applications Erection of dwelling (existing dwelling to be demolished) at Chalk Farm, Temple Road for Mr and Mrs Pammenter – no objection.

Amendment to proposal at 44 East Fen Road for Mr Mayes – no objection as long as clunch wall is retained. It was agreed that the name 'Orchard Close' is put forward as first choice for the new development in Beck Road, and 'Millennium Close' is second choice.

The Isleham Society

20th January David White, the RSPB Information Officer, gave a very interesting illustrated talk entitled "17 years at Lakenheath Fen" He showed how the fen has been developed. The following useful information for potential visitors has been copied from their website:

"At Lakenheath Fen, the RSPB has converted an area of arable farmland into a large wetland, consisting mainly of reed beds and grazing marshes. The new reed beds have attracted hundreds of pairs of reed warblers and sedge warblers, as well as bearded tits and marsh harriers.

Bitterns have been seen increasingly in all seasons of the year. In early summer, hobbies catch insects high over the marshes. Golden orioles breed in the remnant poplar woods on the reserve, along with blackcaps, garden warblers and woodpeckers. Barn owls and kingfishers are regularly seen during the winter months.

There is a new visitor centre where you can find out more about the reserve, its wildlife and history. An events programme is run throughout the year, and family explorer backpacks and trail guides are available.

The reserve is open from dawn to dusk every day. The visitor centre and toilets are open from 9–5 every day 1st March–31st October and open from 10–4 every day 1st November–28th February. The visitor centre is closed from Christmas Eve until New Year's Day.

Entrance charges: Non-members £2 per motor vehicle. Members can park for free, please display your membership card on your dashboard on arrival."

17th February Vernon Place gave a PowerPoint presentation entitled "Old Isleham Photos (no.4)". These were of Isleham school, village sports and social events. He used some of Arthur Houghton's collection plus others of his own, including photos from Peggy Woodroffe and a selection of pictures of Isleham's celebration of the Queen's Silver Jubilee taken by Michael Kelly in 1977. The large number of people in attendance showed their interest in our past village life.

17th March The subject and speaker was changed from the published programme and wasan illustrated slide show and talk given by one of our village residents, architect David Alberry-King. Entitled "East Meets West" he compared the two communities of Isleham and St. Kilda, which historically, had many similarities despite being 850 miles apart. Only one was destined to survive!

major project has been undertaken over the winter months to help protect and conserve the rare wetland plants communities found on Wicken's ancient Sedge Fen. Historically the fen periodically flooded with calcium-rich river water, which had filtered through the chalk of the Newmarket Hills before flowing towards Wicken. Today flooding has diminished, primarily due to shrinkage of the surrounding land following its drainage for arable use, so rainwater is the fen's main source of water, which is more acidic and has led to a decline in its delicate plant communities.

To help the plant communities recover, the Environment Agency has created a new watercourse to carry the calcium rich water to the fen. The most noticeable part of the works is a new wind pump, which will lift this river water up onto the fen, where it will gradually spread out, recharging the watertable.

It is perhaps ironic that Wicken's historic wooden wind pump was originally used to drain nearby Adventurer's Fen for peat cutting, whilst its modern counterpart is designed to replace rather than remove water.

Spring is breaking out all over the fen – many of our over-wintering birds have left and we await the arrival of our summer visitors. Hopefully one of the first migrants will be the cuckoo, which normally arrives in the middle of April. A documentary on the cuckoo recorded by the BBC Natural History Unit at Wicken Fen is scheduled to be broadcast on BBC Radio 4 on Tuesday 5th April at 11.02 and repeated on Thursday 7th April at 21.02.

Planting has begun on the Lode with Longmeadow Community Woodland on White Fen, near Lode. The woodland is one of five being created as part of the Planting Parishes initiative organised by East Cambs District Council and the Woodland Trust aimed at eventually increasing tree cover in East Cambridgeshire by 5–10%.

makers, cross stitchers and quilters but would welcome anybody with a crafty hobby who would like to come and spend time with us


We all bring our own equipment - although of course the fun is in sharing materials and ideas and inspiring each other. We have plenty of scrap materials available for papercrafters!

have recently been asked what Easter means to me, both as a Christian and as a Priest – I hope what follows may answer! It is hard trying to sum up all that it entails but here goes!

I once described Easter, in a sermon, as that glorious moment when the fizz of the tonic hits the gin in the bottom of the glass and the aroma of lime and juniper hits you – made all the more special from a period of abstinence during the long weeks of Lent.

Easter is the climax of the year – where all our expectations and needs, all our prayers (said and silent) are answered in abundance by God, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter morning. For me Easter is about life and love, it is about generosity beyond our wildest dreams, it is about life in the face of death and darkness – it is about us never being separated from the love of God whether we know it or not.


For me this is the reality of all that I see in the ordinariness of people's lives and in the life of the parish where I minister. It is part of being human to seek God, it is part of our make-up to be spiritual; all of us see and experience awe at the enormity of the universe, we are overwhelmed with its mystery and beauty – we all let the tears fall at new life and at the end of life. Jesus lived and died and lives again to continually pour his love into our world, and yet such unfailing and unjudging love can be such a hard thing to accept. And for me,

while as a vicar telling people about God's love is what I do, I continually seek to understand it for myself as well. This is deep and tough on occasions, and an enormous privilege and honour on others.

This Easter message of life and love, of a glass that's not only half full but full to overflowing, also translates itself for me into a crazy service schedule, sermons to write and an enormous amount of work and preparation. There are also the unwell and housebound to visit, those with a new and young faith to encourage, those who are trying to encourage their children and families to uphold. This all happens alongside a parish for whom any of the 6000 inhabitants can ring at any time of day and night and you respond - all the while trying to teach and witness to God's love. Sometimes nerves get frayed! Sometimes the frustrations overwhelm and my family suffer. Sometimes I seek some 'me' time in the practice of yoga or at the Grand Arcade, sometimes some light relief is necessary – and I don't think that's ungodly either! For me there is joy in my shoe collection, there is fun and laughter in my home and around my dinner table, there is God's gracious abundance in my wine rack! For me faith and Easter are about unbounded joy – deep happiness that God loves ME – little old me, with all my peculiarities and doubts. And that God loves each of us the same - deeply and wholly, enough to give us all life forever. Do raise a glass and have a very Happy Easter!
