Communication cut in Isleham –

Rest of World Isolated!

any Isleham residents awoke on the morning of Monday 7th November to discover that the remainder of the civilised world were unable to contact them through normal channels (telephone landline or Internet – mobile phones were unaffected). Some 250 villagers called BT to report a fault, although it is certain that rather more households than this were unable to contact the company.

It came to light that the reason for the fault was that more than one kilometre of cable had been stolen on Sunday night from the Sheldrick's Road/Beck Road area. There were assurances that BT were doing their utmost to replace the cable and restore the village's communications as soon as possible, although these did not always get through. Vernon Place was told to check for updates on the Internet, without an explanation of just how he should do that. Karl Dunn was forced to take a day off work as an engineer had to come and fix the fault at his house, despite his protestations that his neighbours were also without a phone service.

Despite these failures in communication (less than ideal from a company who specialise in nothing but communication!), much of the village was successfully reconnected by the afternoon of Wednesday 9th, albeit with someone else's phone number in a few cases. At the time of writing, it seems that there is still a significant number of residents waiting for the return of their telephones.

BT and Crimestoppers have offered a £1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of the perpetrators: "We would appeal to local residents to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour in or around street cabinets or manhole covers immediately." Anyone concerned about suspicious behaviour should report it directly to the police or to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or visit www.crimestoppers-uk.org.

So far, more than 400 people have been arrested in the UK for stealing cables from the BT network, but with the ever-increasing price of scrap metal barely balanced by the risks of being convicted of this crime, there is not enough being done to ensure that this does not happen again. If I may editorialise for a moment (I AM the editor after all...), what is required is a change of law preventing scrap merchants from paying cash for metal. If all payments have to go directly into a bank account, the thieves will have a far less easy time of it. I urge all villagers to write to Jim Paice MP demanding this!

Re-ablement

Being independent following an operation or illness


f you or someone you care for requires social care support following an illness or operation, this would traditionally have been provided by a care assistant providing direct care to the person in need.

Since September 2010 a new service, re-ablement, has been providing support to enable older people who have poor physical or mental health following illness or an operation to live in their own homes.

Re-ablement programmes can last for as little as a few days and generally don't exceed six weeks. The ethos of re-ablement is to encourage people to do things for themselves rather than having things done for them. There is no charge to the individual as long as they are participating in the programme.

Re-ablement is now being offered to a wider client group including new service users with a physical disability and new occupational therapy referrals. Future development of the service will look at assisting older people who already have a care package but due to illness or physical issues may now



The screening of Wreckers on Saturday 12th November at the Jubilee Centre in Mildenhall was organised by the film's director as a 'thank you' to all locals – mainly from Isleham – who helped in some way with the making of the movie. The screening was well attended, with perhaps 100 villagers and members of the Mildenhall Film Club (who staged the event) there to see the eventual outcome of all the effort of more than two years ago.

Introducing the film, Director Dictynna Hood apologised that so much of the footage of local extras was left on the cutting room floor. This is an inevitable tragedy when editing down to a manageable length. Perhaps we should keep our fingers crossed for deleted scenes on the DVD!

I am not going to write a full review here, but while this is not a film for everyone, I think all readers should be prepared to give it a go, if only for the beautiful photography: I don't believe Isleham has ever looked better! Add to that the ambient sound – the shrieks of swifts and the summer rain were truly evocative. Not to mention the magnificent performances by the three key players, Claire 'Little Dorritt' Foy as Dawn, Benedict 'Sherlock' Cumberbatch as her husband David and Shaun Evans as David's brother Nick. I was especially impressed by Shaun – funny but often disturbing – but mainly because I have never encountered his work before. Definitely an actor to look out for.

The biggest tangible criticism I heard from neighbours at the screening was that the sound was not terribly clear.

Dictynna tells me that this is down to technical issues with the hasty transfer to DVD for this showing. In the cinema the sound quality and sound design is something people remark on as rather wonderful, and this quality will transfer to home DVD screenings. The same goes for some of the night scenes, which should come across better on home screens where any action was all but invisible.

Wreckers will be on limited cinema release on 16th December for a week, as well as available for 'on demand' streaming through the Curzon website: http://www.curzoncinemas.com/film_on_demand/. DVD release is due from Artificial Eye on 12th March 2012, and the film has been sold to the BBC with possible broadcast later in the year. Dictynna will keep us posted about further screenings in Cambridgeshire



Shed/Allotment/Tool Security Advice

- Ensure sheds are of a strong structure and in good repair.
- If possible avoid having windows. Existing windows should be boarded up from the inside; alternatively metal grilles can be installed.
- Contact alarms are easily available through various websites and are cost effective. The alarms are battery operated; once the magnet is broken the alarm is activated. PIR (sensor alarms) are also available on the internet or DIY stores from £5–30.
- Display signage to sheds indicating that all property is security marked and the Police telephone number is displayed 0345 456 456 4.
- Remember to always put away tools and equipment.
- If the allotment is to be left unattended for some time e.g. winter months, remove tools all together.
- Mark your property with your postcode and house number (punching kits are available from hardware stores.) Or use a permanent marker pen.

- Register your property on Immobilise, a free property registering system used nationwide by Police forces (visit www.immobilise.com). Door and window stickers are also available from this website indicating that the property is registered and traceable.
- Personalising tools with paint will make them less appealing to thieves.
- Consider a floor or wall locking device that works by linking tools together with a strong chain threaded through the handles, the chain is then locked to the wall or floor.
- Consider joint funding a perimeter fence for the allotment site.
- A lower cost and ecologically more beneficial method is to plant a hedge. Shrubs such as Hawthorn and Pyracantha have nasty thorns creating a good deterrent to the unwanted visitor.
- Clear signage is essential to convey the message to members of the public that the allotment site is private property.
- Lighting is always a good deterrent to criminals and should be installed if practical.
- Communication is essential to the community's well-being, if problems are being experienced on an allotment use local news letters, neighbourhood watch schemes and other initiatives to raise awareness and encourage a sense of community.
- Use E-cops. This is an interactive email scheme from Cambridgeshire Constabulary and a great way to keep up to date with community news and share information. For further information please visit www. cambs.police.uk/signup/ecops
- Consider social inclusion. Since most of the problems are likely to come from local children it may be beneficial to involve the local youths and community. Ownership may dissuade children from vandalism against the allotment and encourage them to report any suspicious activity.
- Be mindful to keep the allotments free from rubbish as this attracts interest for thieves to have a look to see if there is anything of value to them.





- Cemetery Fees have been increased by 5% for the year 1st September 2011 31st August 2012.
- The Parish Council are arranging to have the floodlights in the churchyard cleaned and repaired.

As I write this we are just beginning Operation Christmas Child 2011. The boxes are going to Kyrgyzstan again this year. The country is located in central Asia, it is very beautiful with snow capped mountains for most of the year but it is very poor. If you prepared a box this year thank you very much – you can be sure it will make a great deal of difference to disadvantaged children in that country. If you helped us process boxes thank you too. We are so glad to be a part of this work as it shows God's love in action.
