Soham and District Neighbourhood Speedwatch

eighbourhood Speedwatch is an initiative set up by the Soham and District Neighbourhood Panel nearly 5 years ago and seeks to highlight speeding in our towns and villages with the aim of reducing the likelihood of accidents and injury to residents and their pets and any resultant damage to their property.



Creating a safer

Cambridgeshire

The Speedwatch team covers the town of Soham and the villages of Kennett, Chippenham, Snailwell, Fordham, Isleham and Wicken and has been very successful

in reducing the speed of local traffic, although we still suffer from those speeding who live outside the area.

Our equipment (which is paid for by the town and parish councils above) displays the passing vehicles speed when they are travelling in excess of the speed limit. We record the vehicle details and send this information to the police who issue a warning letter. The police use our information to track serial offenders and speeding hot spots.

Until recently we have always maintained a healthy number of volunteers to carry out speed checks. However, due to various reasons we are currently down to 4 active and 3 inactive members. Our effectiveness is therefore blunted as the more checks we carry out the greater effect we have on speeding motorists.


We urgently need more volunteers to join Speedwatch and carry out speed checks.

The equipment is portable and easy to set up and operate. Although we have a serious role to play the team enjoy carrying out the checks and its always rewarding with an interesting interaction between ourselves, and local residents and motorists.

oping that everyone had a Happy Christmas and a Healthy New Year.

This article sees the start of a very busy year ahead. With the completion of the work by the archaeologists we now



have a large hole. There were no significant finds from the archaeological dig but this did cause a slight problem in that about half of the site is nearly double the planned depth.

Work has been progressing behind the scenes to resolve the extra engineering on the foundations thrown up by the archaeological dig and as this goes to press it should have been resolved and the builders should have moved onto site.

The weather has certainly been against us. This, and other factors beyond our control (Christmas holidays etc.), has resulted in the

decision being made to postpone the start of the actual build until January. Builders should be on site by the 28th January.

On the 8th December Jill Aspland performed the ground breaking ceremony. Pictures and further details should be in the next Informer as well as the local press. This will also coincide with the full press release as required by the grant providers.

A substantial saving was made with the help of all the volunteers who assisted in the digging and removal of the soil from the site. Our thanks go to them and to all of you for your patience whilst the work went on. Apologies for any mess created but we did try to keep it to a minimum.

Please take note that the fenced off area is now an official building site and as such is out of bounds unless authorised.

We are, as always, looking for any additional help, so if you are willing to put yourself forward for possible inclusion in any aspect of centre management please contact Mark Goldsack or the Parish Clerk for an informal, no obligations discussion.

Have you visited the village website www.isleham-village.co.uk?

he original website was set up by Robin Grant during the 90s and was a great site to get a feeling for our village. The site is funded by Isleham Parish Council. After seeing the request for a replacement website manager in the October 2009 Informer I volunteered to manage the site.

I initially started amending Robin's original design but it was decided fairly early on that a major rewrite of the site was required to meet today's demands. There have been various changes to the structure of the site over the last 3 years including a second full revamp. The feedback from the increasing site visitors has been generally positive with changes for the better and the site content expanding four or five times. There are always bits and pieces that require improvement and an example of this is the presentation of the galleries, which after a few hiccups should now be cleaner and easier to navigate. From first taking on the site it has had two major updates and recently, a change of host allowing a decrease in the yearly cost, but with the benefit of unlimited space (ideal for galleries), and blogs for various organisations.

Some of the items you will find on the site are:

An Events Calendar, Listings of Activities/clubs/organisations, Community Centre, Churches and Chapels, Parish Council members and minutes/agendas, Education, Environment and Help, Events, Local Galleries, Health and Medical contacts/facilities, Places for hire, the *Isleham Informer*, Links to other local sites, Pubs, Shops and Farms Local Services, Transport and Travel, emergency contacts.

The Events Calendar on the site shows dates for meetings, village events etc. At present we are editing all entries and are sure some events are either being missed out or are posted too late to be of any use. To help remedy this we can grant access to any of the village organisations to add or update their own entries, all we will need is an email address, name and organisation, we can the organise access to the relevant calendar; this is already being done by the WI and the Gardeners Club.

Services, shops, farms etc.

If you don't have an entry or the information is incorrect then email us: webmaster[at]isleham-village.co.uk Send your details so that we can include your entry on the site.

Galleries, old programmes and leaflets

There is a range of galleries showing various aspects of the village and village events.

A few of the galleries are just a mixture: we need assistance in dating/naming the photos. Please take a look and send us an email quoting the album name and the picture number (last three digits). We can then put them in their correct album or even create a new one.

We are trying to increase the range of pictures within the galleries and also to publish additional galleries. Do you have any photos tucked away that we may copy?

We need old programmes and leaflets from pantomimes, gala days and any other past and future events. These will be scanned and returned as soon as possible. Please take a quick look in your cup boards, boxes, photo albums etc.

Blogs

Within the site access can also be given to groups/organisations to blogs (Online Logs) where updates can be posted by the group as and when it happens or is needed.

The Parish Council and Gardening Club already have access with the Community Skate Park group soon to come online. This facility takes a bit of pressure off me and also ensures that the information for the relevant group is up to date.

Ideas for the website

I am always looking for ideas to expand the site and increase the content. Some possible ideas include additional blog pages, births, deaths and marriages, a full business listing with pictures if possible. Expansion of the history page with places of interest and more details on the history.

If you have any ideas for additional content for the site or ways that may improve it, please email us with any comments/ suggestions and we will give them all consideration.

All original photos, programmes, leaflets etc received will be well looked after and returned as soon as is practical after copying. These can be in any format paper, photos, digital (email, CD, pendrive). Please contact us beforehand if you have any queries.

Friends of Isleham Nature Reserves

The Friends of Isleham Nature Reserves group has been going for several years now and we are keen to expand the range of activities we do and to encourage others to join us.



Our main responsibility (by agreement with Cambridgeshire County Council) is the management of the railway Local Nature Reserve (just outside the village on the Fordham Road) and to encourage others to use and enjoy it. We are very aware of the importance of the reserve and adjacent area for people exercising their dogs, which means the site attracts lots of local (and not so local) visitors.

We have received a small grant from the County Council, which we are using to buy tools, identification guides and collecting equipment, and to pay for some site management in addition to that which we carry out ourselves. Our aim is to try to restore some more extensive areas of open, botanically rich habitat and to this end we will this year be carrying out some more intensive scrub removal than you'll have seen at the site recently. But don't worry, we will not do this until the berries have been stripped by the visiting flocks of fieldfares and redwings and we still intend to maintain a diverse habitat with plenty of scrub and small trees.

We will be organising more events on the reserve during the summer, including a day bug hunting for children (we had a successful day this summer with families from the Soham area Sure Start Children's Centre), and a day when we will be hosting other Friends groups from Local Nature Reserves elsewhere in Cambridge. Our group members are involved in the management of other sites in and around Isleham including the community orchard project, the village pond, the Wash and the Station Road wood. We are looking at the possibilities for a circular walk that takes in a number of important areas for wildlife, centred around the railway reserve.

As a formally constituted group, we will be holding our AGM in April, including short talks about local wildlife. You may already receive emails from us and want to get more involved, or may wish to hear about our activities. If you do, please look out for the AGM announcement and come along. We will be including a questionnaire in a future issue of the Informer to find out more about what you'd like us to do or how you'd like to get involved. I know it's not as nice subject but we need to talk about dog poo!

ogs have had a special place in our hearts and have had a role in society for centuries. Dogs can be workers or faithful family pets and throughout history they have been loyal companions. All dogs, whether working or hapless hounds, have something in common... they produce poo!

However, it is unfair to blame the canine population; it is the responsibility of the dog owner to ensure that the mess is cleaned up. Although there are a great number of owners that do clear it up, myself included, there are great many that don't because they feel it is unhygienic. However, it is a greater health hazard to leave it where it lies—on pavements, parks or playgrounds. It does not wash away with the rain. It is also against the law.

The Law

Dog fouling is covered by several pieces of legislation:

- The Dog (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 in England & Wales
- Litter (Animal Droppings) Order 1991 made under section 84 (14) of the Environmental Protection Act 1990
- Dog Fouling (Scotland) Act 2003

These Acts require the owner to clear up immediately after his or her dog, should it foul 'designated land'. The fines start at around £40, rising to £1,000 - the maximum amount that can be issued in a courtroom. Designated areas are usually places where dog faeces are likely to cause a health hazard to people. These include children's play parks, public greens and parks, residential areas, cycle paths and walkways to name a few.

Health risks

All faeces contain bacteria that can cause stomach upsets if ingested. However, the greatest risk to public health from dog faeces is toxocariasis.

Toxocariasis

Toxocariasis is an infection of the round worm *Toxocara canis*. It is a disease that is spread via unwashed vegetables and dog faeces. Young children in particular are at risk due to their weaker immune systems and because they are more likely to expose themselves by ingesting the eggs.

Each *T. canis* female can lay up to 700 eggs a day. These are passed out when the dog defecates and can survive for up to three years in soil. After two to three weeks of warm weather the eggs develop into an embryo state, containing larva—this is when they become infective to dogs and people.

The larvae try to migrate through the human body as they would in a dog's, but the human body treats them as foreign material, which causes a reaction and tissue damage. Symptoms can include severe abdominal pain, inflammation of the liver, visual impairment and even blindness.

Bag it and bin it

So next time you are walking around the village and your dog needs to poop, please remember to bag it and bin it. It's not hard, here's how:

Place a clean dog poop bag over your hand and scoop the poo. Tie a knot in the ends and dispose of it in our conveniently placed dog litter bins around the village. If done correctly, there is no need for your hands to come in contact with the poo... if in doubt wear a glove!

Remember, young children walk down Malting Lane and Beck Road every day. They may stand in the dog poo that was left by you. It is now on their shoes, they tread it into school, sit cross legged on the carpet of their class room or in the assembly hall. It is now on the back of their skirt or trousers, they have to wear those clothes for the next 6 hours until home-time. They've eaten their dinner with the hands that have tried, in vain, to clean up their uniform or shoes. The next day they're off sick, mum is beside herself with worry and has had to miss work. It could all have been so easily avoided had you taken the time to poop scoop.


