Set in the 1920s, the story took place in the grounds of Rothersfield Hall and saw the return of Detective Harry Moody (Richard Drayton) and PC Joe Sullen (Jerome Keen) who, with the help of the audience, tried to make sense of a murder amidst a vegetable show. Victoria Rothersfield (Marie Bowker) was the show judge, despite not knowing her marrows from her melons, and had to decide a winner between the competitors, widow Olive Bosely (Nikki Farr), local postie Alfie Swadling (John Bedford), expert herbologists Ivy & Violet Mulford (Cynthia Sheldrick and Pauline Wilkes), ultra-competitive Horace Flitter (Ray Goodwin) and village newcomer Rose Woodley (Vanessa Smith).

A spokesperson for the group said "We were delighted to see so many people laughing and enjoying the evening, with many new faces in the audiences from Isleham and the surrounding villages, and of course our friends and supporters from previous shows."




Armistice Sunday and Remembrance

Sunnica Update

Both West Suffolk County Council and East Cambridgeshire District Council have voted unanimously to reject Sunnica's plans to build a vast solar Industrial Farm and will convey their findings in their written Representation to The Examining Authorities.

An open floor meeting was held on 1st November, followed by accompanied site visits on 2nd and 3rd of November.

Written Representations were submitted by the 11th November, and should now be published on the Planning Inspectorate website.

Further subject specific hearings will take place Tuesday 6th December to Friday 9th Deadline 3:You must register by 22nd November 2022 If you intend to participate in or observe the hearings

There are 9 Deadlines in total. The Ex. A. is under duty to complete the Examination by Sunnica by the end of the period of six months. Tuesday 28th March 2023. The final decision is expected to be made by The Secretary of State by May/June time.

The Canine Care Card is a free service, which helps to ensure your dog's future, in the event of you either passing away, receiving a life-changing diagnosis or moving into a care home. This can often be a great concern to some people, who perhaps do not have a family member or friend in a position to look after their dog, should the worst happen. Therefore, by signing up to the service, Dogs Trust can offer peace of mind, reassuring you that your faithful friend will be well cared for by the charity.

It is easy to sign up to the service, which simply asks for some information on your dog, including their likes and dislikes, as well as your dog's medical history and your vet details. It also asks for you to confirm who you would like as your Dog Guardian. This should be someone you trust, like a friend, family member, solicitor, neighbour or vet, who can sign over ownership of your dog to Dogs Trust on your behalf, should you become seriously ill or pass away.

You can register online by going to www.dogstrust. org.uk and searching for 'Canine Care Card' - or if you do not have access to the internet, you can request a paper version of the application form. Once the form is submitted, Dogs Trust will then write to you, to confirm when your application has been processed.

Once signed up, should your card ever need to be activated, Dogs Trust will then arrange with your Dog Guardian for your dog to come into the rehoming centre or into foster care. With a team of vets, trainers and behaviourists on hand if needed, your dog will then be welcomed, loved and well cared for by the charity, who will work tirelessly to find a loving new home for your much-loved canine companion.



As we near the end of the year and Christmas approaches, I wanted to reflect on 2022 and let you know a few of the matters I have been working on, on your behalf.

This year has not, so far, been without its challenges whether that is the spiralling energy costs or the war in Ukraine. We have also recently sadly mourned the death of our late Queen Elizabeth, who served us with grace and dignity throughout her reign. I was pleased to attend the proclamation both in Westminster and in Cambridgeshire to welcome King Charles III as our new monarch.

I know constituents across Cambridgeshire are concerned about the war in Ukraine. And I have been humbled by the response of so many families who have supported Ukrainian refugees. Many families across our area have opened their homes to those fleeing conflict, and I was pleased to hold an event in the summer to bring together some of the volunteers, organisations and families who have been involved in supporting those who have come to the UK.

I know that cost of living is a real concern, and I am committed to helping constituents across South East Cambridgeshire find the support and advice they need. In my previous role as Financial Secretary to the Treasury, I was proud to work with ministerial colleagues to introduce a package of measures to help tackle the cost of living crisis. These included a £400 discount off energy bills. Since then the Government has gone further with the introduction of the Energy Price Guarantee which caps the price per unit of electricity / gas from 01 October 2022 for at least six months. This price guarantee will save the average household £1,000 per year compared with the previous energy price cap announced by Ofgem in August. In the coming months, the Government will consider how it supports households with energy bills beyond April 2023.

I know that residents continue to be concerned about the Sunnica solar farm proposal. In November I spoke in opposition to the scheme at the East Cambridgeshire District Councnil planning meeting. The next step is written submissions to the Planning Inspectorate triggering the final stage in the process. As part of the Examination, residents who registered as 'Interested Parties' earlier in the year have the opportunity to submit a 'Written Representation'. This is a more detailed assessment of the application than the 'Relevant Representation' from earlier this year, and permits supporting evidence or documents if appropriate.

I will be making my own submission by the 11 November deadline, and I invite all who are eligible to do the same by uploading their submission to the designated Planning Inspectorate website.

For those who have not registered to take part in the Examination, it may still be possible, at the discretion

of the Examination Authority, to submit a representation, especially if you have only recently moved to the area. You can write to the Examining Authority if you would like to make a personal enquiry via the following email address: sunnica@planninginspectorate. gov.uk.

In addition to the Planning Inspectorate, I continue to represent my constituents' concerns about the proposal to other relevant authorities. I recently wrote with Matt Hancock MP to Natural England to ask that they review their verdict on Sunnica's land appraisal after the Say No to Sunnica Action Group identified problems with Sunnica's methods.

I look forward to continuing my close work with the Say No to Sunnica action group, who have been tirelessly campaigning since the application launched before the pandemic. I hope that together we can avert this scheme.

Finally, I was delighted to open Asynt's new international marketing facility in Isleham in July. The opening of the new facility was partly possible thanks to the availability of grant funding, including from Innovate UK and Growth Works, and coincided with the business' nineteenth anniversary.
