

Lucy Frazer MP

Matt Hancock MP and I recently wrote to the Planning Inspectorate to raise our concerns over the Sunnica application. We specifically highlighted the quality and substance of the engagement process with residents; Sunnica's decision to decline the open meeting to discuss their DCO submission; and the lack of briefing given to us as constituency MPs on



any changes to the proposal put forward by Sunnica.

We shared constituent concerns over lack of access to information, the quality and extensiveness of webinars, the lack of time to review information, and Sunnica's unwillingness to provide further details about the Scheme during the consultation process and after.

We asked that the Planning Inspectorate consider our assessment that the consultation undertaken by Sunnica should be deemed inadequate as part of the ongoing acceptance phase of the Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project process.

Unfortunately, the Planning Inspectorate has decided to progress Sunnica's application to the Examination stage. This is, of course, very disappointing news. I would like to assure you that I will follow all further developments closely and I will continue to oppose Sunnica's application on behalf of my constituents.







St Andrew's Parish Church

Although the new year and any resolutions that came with it might seem a distant memory already by now, the arrival of spring, with its longer days and the signs of new life in nature bring us another opportunity for self-examination and reflection with longer lasting consequences. Easter falls relatively late this year, on Sunday 17 April, which means that the season of Lent begins on 2 March (Ash Wednesday), 46 days beforehand.*

Lent is often portrayed as a miserable time, when we give up one or more of life's little treats and conveniences that keep us going through normal times and carry stoically on, testing ourselves (and perhaps also our loved ones) as we sharpen up our self-discipline. If giving up chocolate, caffeine, or your favourite TV series for a short while is an end in itself, then chances are this March and April may be bit a bit of a miserable time, and you'll be counting the days until Lent is over.

But what if Lent were to be a time not of irritation and minor inconvenience, but of taking stock, making space to grow, and renewing our course towards Easter and beyond? And what if we didn't just think about that for ourselves, but for our neighbours, our community, and for the wider world too? What difference would it make?

All our experiences during the COVID pandemic have been different, and trying to compare them isn't helpful. But being forced to stop or change much of our usual activity did make us think. How were we going to fill the gaps?

Giving something up can free us for other things – a walk in the fresh air, time to phone a friend, pick up a book or a crafting project, a moment to notice the spring bulbs, or maybe even just time to chill. Time for ourselves is important for our well-being, but just as vital is the benefit to us of doing things for others. We may not like to think of it that way – helping others to help ourselves – but give and take are key ingredients of successful community.

Where will you find the gaps, and how will you fill them this spring? Whether it be a favour for a neighbour, giving time or donating in kind to a local or national charity, making a small change that helps you tread more lightly on the planet, may this be a time of growth and new life for us all.

the season in the year 325. If you're wondering why Lent starts 46 calendar days before Easter rather than 40, it's because the Sundays don't count – make of that what you will!

Having been postponed from 2020, the team are now back on track to get the production on stage at The Beeches on April 1st & 2nd. And there will be some different faces this year too.



On the slow train.....

Windows that slide up and down, and that you lean out of to open the door, the hiss of steam and smell of coal and hot oil, the chug of pistons gathering speed, that distant whistle ...

The Great Eastern Cambridge to Mildenhall single track branch line was just under twenty miles long and had 8 stations and 3 halts. How many of the eight can you name?* Construction began January 1883. The first section between Barnwell Junction and Fordham opened for passenger traffic June 1884 and the line was completed the following year at a total cost of £76,327. Four trains per day were timetabled each with First, Second, and Third class carriages. A speed limit of 30 mph was in force over the whole route in both directions. Fordham was a junction having originally been built on the Ely to Newmarket line. Isleham was sixteen and three quarter miles from Cambridge. The station had an Up and a Down platform and the main building with its ornate canopy included a Booking Office, a Parcels Office, a Waiting Room and the Station Master's house. There was also a goods yard with a coal merchant's shed. It seems rather good value at £2170 doesn't it? Isleham's first Station Master was George Vipan who held that position from 1885 to 1893.

Trains left Cambridge at 7.15am, 9.35am, 12.30pm and 5.53pm arriving Mildenhall at 8.55am, 10.37am, 1.25pm and 6.45pm.

Business was brisk. In 1892 10,175 passengers boarded the train at Mildenhall and 11,128 tons of goods and coal were dealt with there. By 1919 five trains a day were running each way but by 1922 that was back to four although the halts at Fen Ditton, Exning Road and Worlington Golf links had been added. A 'Market Day' return ticket Worlington to Cambridge cost 3s.11d.

Isleham Station, early 20th century

1939 brought blacked-out carriages, dimly lit stations and crowded trains. During the war on Dec. 4th 1940 there was an occasion when enemy aircraft dropped three high explosive bombs in what was an unusual aircraft attack on a minor branch line passenger train which had just left Exning Road Halt. Happily no fatalities

Nationalisation came to the railways in 1948 but does not seem to have greatly affected the line.

During the 1950's excursions to Yarmouth, Skegness and other places were popular, with trains carrying nearly two hundred passengers. Outgoing goods traffic from Isleham and Fordham consisted of flowers (often three or four hundred boxes a day), soft fruit, trees and sugar beet. Inward would be coal, coke, cattle food and fertilizer.

Diesel units were introduced in 1956 with 128 seats in two carriages. After two years diesel trains replaced the steam engines.

Rationalisation. 1961 'passenger rail facilities are

greater than can be justified for the sparsely populated area...it is proposed to convert Quy and Isleham to unstaffed public sidings'.

By 1962 it was becoming clear that the Cambridge-Mildenhall line would close for passenger traffic. Seventy seven years of complete and steady service... but the era was nearly over. British Rail sent out gangs of men to dismantle stations leaving a bare minimum of facilities for single line freight working. The last passenger train left Mildenhall on 16 June 1962 and the last goods train, carrying mainly sugar beet, on 10 July 1964. Change and decay set in. Much of the line has been taken up or overgrown or built over.

Fortunately for us a stretch of the line on The Isleham-Fordham Road is well cared for and managed by the volunteer Friends of Isleham Nature Reserve to support a range of wildlife habitats.

Can someone fill in the history of the station postclosure please, and the Tenrich Tyre connection and present occupancy?

All the above information comes from a booklet 'By Rail to Mildenhall' published by Mildenhall Museum in 1978 and lent to me by John Shead, and from 'The Mildenhall Branch' lent to me by Colin Cresswell. I close with the Postscript to the Mildenhall Museum booklet, - and an invitation to send to me any stories you may have about the glory days when Isleham was

connected to the outside world by train!

'The familiar sights and sounds of this country branch have passed away. The engine whistle, the slamming of carriage doors, the smell of smoke and steam on a crisp clear morning or a foggy wintry evening, are now no more. For many this branch is but a name on a map, to others it was half a lifetime's work, while to many more their journeys on it are largely forgotten.' If you are into nostalgia for the bye gone railway times listen to Flanders and Swann 'The Slow Train' and read Edward Thomas' poem 'Addlestrop'.

*The eight were Barnwell Junction, Stow-Cum-Quy, Bottisham and Lode, Swaffham Prior, Burwell, Fordham, Isleham, Mildenhall

A personal memory. Colin Cresswell has kindly described for us what the journey to Soham was like for a secondary school boy fifty years ago.

After being accustomed to walking, scootering or riding to the local school for six years, the 20-40 minutes bus journey to Soham must come as a bit of a shock to many of Isleham's 11year olds; and that's to say nothing of the walk to, and wait for, the bus with the possibility of rain and the cold of winter.

So it might be interesting to compare the same journey for those transferring to secondary school in Soham more than half a century ago.

It was an early start to cycle to the railway station in time for the first train at approx. 7.30am. The ride along Station Road would often develop into a wild chase as the smoke from the approaching train rose

between the fields in the direction of Mildenhall where its journey had started. Mrs Dennis, a gracious, long suffering lady, allowed cycles to be left in her small yard just prior to the station approach. All too often they were heaved in one on top of another in the mad rush to reach the station and cross the line to the Fordham bound platform.

On particularly cold mornings another generous person, Mr Raven the signalman, would invite frozen youngsters (when either they were early or the train was late) to enjoy the roaring fire in his signal box. This was all the more welcome because the heating system in the two or three ancient carriages which made up the train usually produced far more steam than heat!!

However, there was little time to settle into the chilly seats before a change had to made at Fordham, the next station along the line. There it was a matter of waiting for the connecting train to arrive from Newmarket before another one-station hop to Soham. Had the school been a little nearer to the station there might not have been much more to be said but the distance at the Soham end was longer than the cycle ride in Isleham – and now of course, the cycles which would have eased the distance were back in Mrs Dennis' yard!!

The walk around Mill Corner, along the length of Clay Street and into High Street was a long one but there were numerous gateways and passageways between houses so, with little traffic about and plenty of time since the journey from home had begun so early, the boys enjoyed some hectic games of football on the way. Retrieving the ball from gardens and yards could take up time but there was no excuse for being late at journey's end - the school playground! Overall, upwards of an hour was spent getting to school in those days; that was when the trains were on time!

The homeward train did not leave Soham until nearly 5pm so there was time after school for some homework, a detention (!) or a leisurely game of football along Clay Street. But again this

often concluded with a frantic dash along the station approach road when the distant signal indicated that the train was imminent.

For those arriving at the station in good time there was another experience which surely would not occur if the trains were still running today. Inexplicably, the little-used Soham station, still with makeshift buildings that dated from the disastrous explosion on an ammunition train towards the end of World War 2, boasted a W H Smith bookstall. And, perhaps even more unbelievably, the manager allowed the lads to borrow comics and other magazines to read on the nearby benches – well within his line of sight, of course! This may well have been the most people he had seen all day.


And so the morning journey was reversed with the change in Fordham and an arrival in Isleham station of about 5.20pm. During the winter months that meant cycling or walking home in the dark at the end of a full day, up to three hours of which were spent in travelling.

The journey now is not quite so varied but thankfully nor is it quite as time consuming!
